11.3 To discuss feedback from the Village green Sub Group regarding the Severn Treescapes offer to provide new trees for the Village Greens and agree a course of action.

Dear Cathy and Roger,

It was good to meet you and have a look at Ham Green on Wednesday.

In summary it seems like a good plan to plant more trees, and especially fruit trees!

Gloucestershire County Council have a scheme offering free trees to landowners and community groups, and fruit trees are included in that. They do not offer the funding for the tree protection though, so that would be a cost to the Parish.

I can help with an application and the sourcing of the trees as I am working with 7 other landowners and plan to make one big order to reduce tree costs. Each landowner / group would have agreed their project with the Council and then I will arrange the tree order. I still need to work out whether we can get separate deliveries at different times.

I looked at the old maps and can see that there was a lot of orchard in the area which is now gone, although no evidence that there was orchard on the Green was found. To bring that habitat back would be a great addition.

One point that I would like you to be confident about is having the right to plant trees on the green. I will leave it to you to check that out.

Although the deer threat may not seem significant, I would recommend guarding against them. The Forestry Commission Land Information Search has identified there being 3 deer species posing a moderate risk to trees; Muntjac, Roe and Fallow deer. I would recommend a wire height of at least 1.5m. Guarding materials (2 posts and weld mesh, calculated on 10 guards per roll of mesh, have come out at £40-45 each. Ultimately it would be your decision on how to protect them.

I have also attached my notes from the last series of Orchard Workshops – Planning and Planting. And I will add you to the invite list for the next series of workshops being held this winter. The notes include information on root stocks, planting patterns and guarding. We discussed vigorous rootstocks being the best for traditional varieties and one grown, less vulnerable to browsing.

Please find attached an example of a planting plan to create a mixed orchard on the Eastern section of Ham Green. The plan shows 25 trees – 4 pear, 10 apple, 7 plum and 4 cherry arranged so that the shorter trees are to the south of the taller. But it is only a suggestion.

Hopefully this will provide sufficient information for discussion at your next meeting. Sorry it is a bit rushed.

14. To discuss and agree a course of action regarding the Ash Dieback replanting scheme through GCC Highways.

Dear Sir / Madam Reference:

Ash Dieback Project, replanting scheme.

In June 2020 GCC Highways launched the Ash Dieback Project to start to tackle the effects of the disease within the county. The disease also known as Chalara is caused by a fungus which affects the vascular system of Ash trees and can kill young specimens very rapidly. Older trees can resist for longer but are likely to shed limbs, become unstable and are extremely likely to die.

During the three years, GCC Highways managed to remove 12,640 infected Ash Trees which posed a danger to highway users. With an aim of replanting at least two trees for every diseased tree felled.

During the last three planting season a total of 40,597 trees were planted by March 2023, either by our Ash Dieback team or through providing young trees to Parish Councils.

Local Parish Councils Replanting

The replanting season runs between November and March, we would encourage the local parish councils to use their local knowledge and expertise to assist us in identifying suitable areas within your community where replanting can be undertaken. If practical we would be looking at planting in groups of mixed native whips (young tree seedlings 2-3 years old) rather than larger specimen trees, but we can consider all requests.

Within the capacity of the Ash Dieback Project, we currently have two options available;

1. Submit areas to be considered for replanting on highways land by the Ash Dieback Team.

2. Submit a request for whips / trees to be donated to the parish council, to plant themselves within the community.

This can be projects such as planting Hedgerows, Wildlife Corridors, Orchards, filling in corners of fields or even supporting a local community planting project such as sensory garden, forest schools and much more.

If you would like to submit a request for trees to be planted during November 2023 to March 2024, please complete the attached form, and return to by 14/10/2023. This planting work is being undertaken in addition to the County Council's existing pledge on tree planting.

Tree Warden Scheme GCC are in process of setting up Gloucestershire Tree Warden scheme with the Tree Council, if you wish to become a tree warden or wish to find out more, please email.
